Hometown Festival Unites Community

Originally designed to celebrate the Round Hill's "small town feel," the Round Hill Hometown Festival features events like the Downhill Derby, an old-fashioned pie-eating contest, and the ever-popular Round Hill Memories discussion about days past in Round Hill. This year's Festival, the sixth annual, is scheduled for Saturday, May 24.

The Festival has enjoyed phenomenal growth and community participation since its inaugural year in 2003.

"The Hometown Festival has become not just a Town event, but truly a Round Hill community event," said Festival Coordinator Noreen Payne. "The elementary school, home schoolers, sports teams, Scout troops, the Fire Department, the Arts Center, local churches, Town officials, local businesses—all of Round Hill comes out to participate in the day, and it shows in all aspects of the event."

The day starts with a 5K race and a parade through town ending at the Memorial Ceremony in the Town Park and culminates in a live concert in the park. Entertainment is available throughout the day and community groups offer a variety of games and activities.

The Festival's events are organized and run by volunteers from all around Round Hill.

Hanes to Begin Teaching; Passes Leadership of Art Center to New Executive Director

Walk into the Round Hill Arts Center and chances are you'll be greeted with a friendly "Hello" from the Center's artistic director, Hope Hanes.

Come fall, however, Hanes will be greeting a new set of faces, and the face behind the desk at the Arts Center will be new as well.

Hanes, who co-founded the Center eight years ago with her father, Wally Johnson, and his wife, Carolyn Kruger, is "going back to what it is that I do best and enjoy most—teaching, doing art, and studying languages." She is enrolled in a certification course and expects to be teaching in the fall.

A search for a new executive director for the Arts Center is underway.

During her tenure, Hanes has been instrumental in establishing events such as the monthly bluegrass jam sessions, Western Loudoun Studio Tour, and Round Hill Last Night New Year's Eve celebration.

"Hope has given a lot of her time and energy to making the Arts Center not only a place to experience, enjoy and take home the artistic talents of Western Loudoun but also a place in which the community can get together—all of which has contributed to and reinforced the uniqueness of Round Hill," said Mayor Frank Etro.

"We appreciate her many efforts and will miss her enthusiasm and desire to share the local arts with the community."

The Center has grown exponentially under Hanes' leadership. She credits

the growth to having had "wonderful support from the visual artists and musicians that participate."

Managing this growth—and some of its unintended consequences—will be among the challenges facing the Center's new executive director.

Facilitating and fund raising for improvements to the historic building will be one of the most pressing orders of business, as a surprise visit from the Loudoun County Fire Marshall in March brought to light the need to update the former furniture factory to meet modern safety regulations

While operation of the gallery and classes meet code, large gatherings like the jam sessions require additional precautions. Special care will need to be taken to honor the character of the historic structure.

The Center is exploring funding options for this work. In the Center's early days, Hanes recalled, the Town helped secure grant money to ensure the Center's survival. Today, once again, local support may prove crucial to the Center continuing to be a place "where the arts and the community converge."

Etro Ends Term as Architect of Community

A "real" architect by profession, over the last 18 years Round Hill Mayor Frank Etro has focused his public service efforts on building community.

As a member of the Planning Commission and Town Council, and ultimately as mayor, Etro took the lead on projects, initiatives and events intended to unite the Town with its surrounding neighborhoods to form the "community of Round Hill."

A strong believer that citizen participation is critical to community building, Etro consistently encouraged the formation of committees to seek creative solutions to specific challenges.

The resulting accomplishments include the build-out of the Town Park and the creation and organization of the annual Hometown Festival, both of which continue to be instrumental in fostering a family-friendly community.

Mayor Etro also united citizen groups with a common purpose in the battle to keep schools within the community and an effort to get the best possible results for the planned Aquatic Center at Woodgrove Park.

Convinced that pedestrian networks are circulatory

systems that bring life to communities, Etro worked diligently for a well-connected Round Hill.

He organized and led a series of charrette processes that established As mayor, Etro focused on community-centric design guidelines for commercial



building the community.

areas and new neighborhoods, and developed the pedestrian-focused Round Hill Streetscape Master Plan. Two current projects, the Franklin Park Trail and the Main Street Enhancement, rely on this plan.

Mayor Etro has decided not to seek another term, bringing to an end (for now at least) his service as an elected official.

No matter where one looks around the Round Hill area, however, the positive influences of Etro's community vision are unmistakable. So, when you see soon-to-be "Citizen Frank" out and about in the community that he was instrumental in architecting, please be sure to say "thank you."

- Family Drive-in Movie: Located in Stephen's City (30 minutes); see a double-feature in a clean, kid-friendly drive-in. A playground keeps kids busy until the feature starts.
- Miniature Golf: Shenandoah Miniature Golf, just seven miles north of Winchester. 18 holes, ice cream for sale, and a lovely fish pond in the

center. They host birthday parties and offer nighttime golfing with lighted balls. Bring hats on a sunny day!

- Hiking: Skyline Meadows State Park (30-minunte drive) has gorgeous scenery from its many hiking trails. The Strawberry Festival, held every Memorial Day weekend, offers great music, scenery and strawberry short-
