# **Community Survey Results to Help Guide Comprehensive Plan Update**

Last fall, the Town of Round Hill conducted a Community Survey to help gather public input on the future of the Town.

The results of that survey have now been compiled into a summary document that will help guide the Town's Comprehensive Plan Update process, which will be taking place this fall. The summary document is now available online at www.roundhillva.org.

The Comprehensive Plan helps guide the Town Council and Planning Commission's decisions regarding future development. It helps establish priorities and provides a picture of how the community envisions itself. The Community Survey asked questions that helped define these priorities and vision.

Some of the main topics the survey covered, and that the Comprehensive Plan must address, are:

- the future of the vacant 12-acre commercial property on the corner of East Main Street and Evening Star
- the revitalization of Round Hill's central commercial district (Main and Loudoun Streets) and
- the use of infill residential development in Round Hill's National Historic District.

The future of the 12-acre commercial property is one of most important policy decisions of this plan because the site is strategically located not only off of Route 7 but also at the Town gateway.

The Planning Commission recognizes that this shopping center will define how Round Hill is viewed to visitors and future residents.

The Town is limited in its ability to control the types of uses in the future shopping center, but the Town can work with the developers on the behalf of the residents to try create the best shopping center for Round Hill.

The Town also has the ability to influence the layout, design and architecture of the shopping center.

A strong focus on revitalization and infill development will be a theme in the 2016 Comprehensive Plan because Round Hill is quickly approaching build out.

The Town's utility infrastructure capacity limits Round Hill's future growth to about 200 homes beyond those development projects already in the pipeline or those that have been proffered.

Consequently, the Plan will not be focusing on growth beyond the Joint Land Management Area (Round Hill's urban growth boundary) but instead on how to improve or enhance existing infrastructure, housing, businesses and community facilities.

On Sept. 15, the Planning Commission will host a second Public Vision Workshop for the Comprehensive Plan. This meeting, at 6 p.m. in the Round Hill Elementary School library, will represent the "coming together" of a year's worth of public participation.

Additional workshops and public hearings will be held throughout the fall as the Planning Commission and Town Council work with the citizens of the greater Round Hill community to help update the Comprehensive Plan.

All members of the public are invited to these meetings and are encouraged to participate in helping shape Round Hill's future.
