The Round Hill United Methodist and Round Hill Baptist churches are both planning events on Saturday, April 2, that will help others in need.


Round Hill Methodist Church will join with Harmony Methodist Church in Hamilton and Leesburg's Evergreen Methodist Church to sponsor the 7th Annual West Loudoun Stop Hunger Now meal packaging event. The event will be held from 8 a.m.-12 p.m. at Round Hill Elementary School.

The goal is to package at least 40,000 meals for shipment to worldwide locations of need. The churches are seeking at least 300 volunteers for this single-day event and donations of at least \$11,500 to purchase the required food and packaging materials.

This full-day event in the heart of Round Hill features something for everyone – from the morning's 5k through to the evening concert in the Town Park —so be sure to mark your calendars.



Artists' Shop to Open on Main Street in April

Multi-media artist and Round Hill resident Jenny McMahon is collaborating with two other local artists to open a storefront on Main Street that will feature their creations.

McMahon's business, shtuff, is a line of home design elements created from found objects. Pieces are designed using reclaimed wood, metal and paper as well as graphic, mechanical and architectural elements. Work includes clocks, frames, lighting and a variety of organizational items. Since items are made from found objects, many of them are singular creations that cannot be duplicated.

Maureen Alvarez of Chunk of Happiness Pottery and Scottie Vosburgh of Saved by Scottie are joining McMahon in the venture. For now the shop will feature their work, but the artists will be looking for the opportunity to have other artists' work in the shop.

"We want this to be a shop for people to purchase one-of-a-kind creations from local artists and other unique finds for their home," McMahon said.

Located in the former home of Mary Ruth Peele's Copeland House Antiques at 20 Main Street, the store will be open on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of the last weekend of every month, by appointment, and by chance. The trio of artists are shooting for a grand opening the weekend of April 22.

"I am so excited for the opportunity to be able to grow my business in a unique building with a long history in the Town of Round Hill," McMahon said.

"To be able to have the building continue as a local business also pays respect to all the hard work Mary Ruth Peele put into her long-standing business in the town. I hope that our monthly opening becomes an event the community anticipates and looks forward to each month."

night and 4 p.m. countywide. The Round Hill Town Code prevents open burning at all times within Town limits without written permission of the Fire Marshall.

All open burning must be reported to the Loudoun County Emergency Communications Center (ECC) at 703-777-0637, *before* ignition and when the fire is extinguished. All fires must be actively attended (responsible 18-year-olds or older) with means to extinguish the fire. Materials are not allowed to be added after midnight.

TOWN ELECTIONS MAY 3

Municipal elections in the Town of Round Hill will be held on Tuesday, May 3. Town elections are held at the Round Hill Center, at 20 High Street. Polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Residents within the corporate limits are encouraged to come out and vote to fill the positions of mayor, a two-year term, and three Town Council seats, which are four-year terms.

As of publication, incumbent Mayor Scott Ramsey had filed for re-election, as had Vice Mayor and Council Member Mary Anne K. Graham. Two newcomers have also filed for Council seats: Kim D. Fortunato and Mike K. Minshall.

Current Council members Dan Botsch and Clark Klipple, whose terms expire on June 30, have not yet filed for re-election. The filing date is March 1. Candidates may seek election through write-in campaigns.
