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Treasurer Betty Wolford to Retire After More than 30 Years of Service

On June 30, Betty Wolford, treasurer for the Town of Round Hill, will be retiring. One thing is very clear, whoever takes her place will have some very big shoes to fill.

Betty began working for the Town of Round Hill in 1978, when she started as part-time help to cover for the treasurer during vacations.

"The treasurer would go to Florida for vacation, and I was asked to step in and keep things going," Betty said.

Eventually, she was hired to replace the treasurer in 1981. Betty left Round Hill to work for the Town of Middleburg from 2000 to 2006, when she returned to Round Hill. She has served as treasurer ever since.

Along with her 31 years of service as treasurer, Betty has served as the town clerk and temporary zoning administrator. She has also been a member of the Planning Commission for seven years.

Betty's husband, Jeff Wolford, served on the Town Council from 1976-1978, and was mayor from 1978-1996. Together, they dedicated years to the service of the Round Hill residents, functioning as Town staff, keeping the water and sewer system working and managing the day-to-day business of the Town.

Betty and Jeff moved to Round Hill in 1970. She has seven children, 17 grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren.

"Betty is the most dedicated employee I have ever worked with," said Town Administrator Buster Nicholson. "She loves Round Hill and has played a major role in getting us to where we are today. She is a very thoughtful and kind person, and we will miss working with her."

The Town is currently in the process of reviewing applications for Betty's

successor. Betty will return as a consultant to help with the transition of the new hire.

Sleeter Lake Park Receives Funding from Loudoun County

The Town of Round Hill recently learned that Loudoun County has approved \$173,000 worth of funding toward the completion of Sleeter Lake Park in its FY2017 budget.

This money will be combined with a grant for \$75,000 from the State Department of Game & Inland Fisheries that the Town received in 2015. The grant is for construction of a public boating facility on the Sleeter Lake parkland by October 2016.

The public boating facility will be for non-motorized boats (such as canoes and kayaks) and for boats with nongasoline powered motors. There will also be a fishing pier and the ability to fish from the shoreline.

The Town was proffered 11 acres of parkland along Sleeter Lake with public boating access in 1990 as part Continued next page

Continued from previous page of the larger rezoning application that permitted the creation of the Villages of Round Hill and its accompanying neighborhoods.

Sleeter Lake Park will be a public park with vehicular access from Lakefield Road and pedestrian access via a trail from the Lake Point neighborhood.

It will be a passive park for the purposes of viewing the lake, walking the nature trails, small picnics, wildlife watching, boating access and fishing access.

There will also be an educational component to allow the public to learn about the history of Sleeter Lake and its role in the former Round Hill Orchard Industry.

As a passive park, there will not be any ball fields or athletic courts.

HYDRANT FLUSHING TO OCCUR MAY 10

The Town of Round Hill Utilities Department will be flushing fire hydrants in the corporate limits of Town on May 10.

Water mains are flushed by opening fire hydrants and allowing them to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment, which normally accumulates in the water mains.

Water is safe to drink and safe to use during the flushing. However, flushing may result in some discoloration and sediment in the water.

If discoloration or sediment is evident, residents may want to avoid doing laundry. Flushing may also introduce air into the water lines, which can temporarily cause erratic flow.

COMMUNITY GARDEN PLOTS NOW AVAILABLE FOR SEASON

The Round Hill Community Garden on Falls Place is preparing to open for its seventh growing season this spring. The garden is a partnership between the Town of Round Hill and the local people and businesses of Round Hill.

The group's main goals are to promote involvement in the larger community by supporting local food pantries, to provide an educational experience for the next generation and to maintain a space for area residents to grow their own food with other local gardeners.

On-site amenities developed over the years include:

- protective 8-foot mesh fencing and reinforced small gauge fencing at ground level to keep deer, rabbits and other pests from crops
 - on-site irrigation and hoses
- compost bins for in-garden recycling of organic matter
- a secure storage shed to contain tools and supplies for common use and to provide space for plot holders to store additional items.

The garden holds to organic methods of cultivation. Chemical pesti-

cides, herbicides and fertilizers are forbidden. Organic soil amendments and pest remedies such as manure, compost, marigolds etc., may be used instead. Area farm supply and garden stores carry many suitable products. The RHCG also has ties to the Loudoun Master Gardeners.

Plots can be leased per season on a first-come, first-served basis for the following fees:

- 20 x 20 feet (one season) \$25
- 20 x 10 feet (one season) \$15
- Plot Deposit (refundable) \$25
- Water Deposit (refundable) \$10. Community partners, including Continued next page
