

Long-Anticipated Franklin Park Trail, Main Street Improvement Projects In Final Land Acquisition

It may seem hard to believe that a project that has been discussed since 2003 may actually happen after so many false starts and missed schedules, but the Town Council has identified the Main Street and Franklin Park Trail Projects as its top priority above all else this year and has set the goal to bid the projects this summer.


Both projects are fully funded and now have 100% design approval from VDOT. All that remains before construction bid is acquiring the necessary rights to enter and disturb properties for construction and, in some cases, to add a few feet to the VDOT right-of-way to make room for the new sidewalks.

The Town and Loudoun County are currently meeting with residents along Main Street and Loudoun Street whose properties will be impacted by these projects to resolve any open concerns and to get signatures required to proceed.

The Town of Round Hill's Main Street Project will build sidewalks, stormwater improvements and add street parking between the center of town and the old train station.

Loudoun County's Franklin Park Trail project will build sidewalks, stormwater improvements and a trail from the center of town along East Loudoun Street, through a pedestrian tunnel under the Rt. 7 bypass, and on to Franklin Park, reusing existing sidewalks and trails in portions.

The Town and the County have agreed to bid and construct the projects under a single award to save money and facilitate their joint construction, as the two projects have linked facilities. The Main Street project cannot be built without the storm-

water piping that the Franklin Park Trail project will install.

The Town currently has inadequate facilities to route stormwater, and these two projects will not just improve Round Hill's sidewalks, they will also trap all the water that sheets across Main Street and East Loudoun and keep it out of the yards and basements of neighbors who live downhill.

It will also provide legal parking spots off the roadway for many residents on Main Street. Any parking that obstructs the major collector road is illegal under State Code, but some residents have no alternative. The most visible changes will be new connections to the Villages of Round Hill, Lakepoint, the future Sleeter Lake Park and Franklin Park.

County, state and federal agencies are providing over 90% of the funds to construct these projects. Success will demonstrate that the Town is a good investment for future grants. The Town wants to follow up with improvements further north on Main and south along New Cut Road.

The Town urges all residents to support these projects during planning as well as to have patience during the construction phase when it finally arrives.

HUMMEL FILLS COUNCIL VACANCY; SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN NOVEMBER

Round Hill resident Michael Hummel was appointed to the Town Council on Jan. 19; Hummel fills a vacancy resulting from Kimberly Fortunato's resignation. Hummel will serve as an interim Town Council member until November 2017.

At that time, a special election will be held for the remainder of the term, which runs through June 30, 2020. Any resident interested in seeking the Town Council position must be a qualified voter and reside within the corporate limits of the Town of Round Hill (see map to the right).

Candidates must submit required paperwork to the General Registrar's office at 750 Miller Dr., S.E., Suite C, Leesburg, Va. by 7 p.m. on June 13, 2017. The required forms are available on the Town's website, *www.roun-dhillva.org*, or may be picked up at the Town Office, 23 Main Street. In March, the Town is sending two planning commissioners and two town council members to the 89th Certified Planning Commissioner Program in Purcellville, hosted by Virginia Tech.


