HeroHomes Building House on High Street for Army Veteran and Family

In 2015, Loudoun-based builder Jason Brownell was asked to manage a home-building project in Lovettsville for a Marine veteran who was seriously injured by an explosion in Iraq.

Brownell was so touched by the story of Tony Porta's heroic struggle for survival that he was inspired to join forces with Aimee McGranahan and Matthew Lowers to form a nonprofit organization—HeroHomes to give back to other veterans.

"When Tony told me his story, I felt as if I had become activated to do God's work for our wounded veterans and to stimulate others into action," Brownell said.

"I wanted to make sure his suffering and sacrifice for my freedom and democracy was not in vain and that we as a community took care of others like him."

Earlier this spring, HeroHomes began construction of its second project—a partially subsidized home on High Street in Round Hill for Army Staff Sergeant Jarrad Davenport and his family.

Davenport sustained injuries during rocket attacks on his outpost in Iraq in 2011. Since that time, he has spent time recovering from his injuries at Walter Reed National Military Center in Bethesda, Md., and earned a degree in accounting from Colorado Technical University.

Davenport said he and his family are very excited to be moving to Round Hill. He cites the military support base, small-town atmosphere and the reputation of Loudoun County public schools as part of what drew his family to the area.

"This year has been very challenging, overwhelming and extremely stressful, with my retirement from the military, graduating from college and moving the family to Virginia," Davenport said.

"However, the HeroHomes organi-

zation has been really instrumental in providing guidance, information and support."

Davenport and his wife Latoya hope to be moved in to their new home in time for their 6-year-old son Xzavier to start school in Round Hill. Davenport's two older sons, Jarrad, Jr. and Darrius, are in college.

According to its mission statement, HeroHomes was established to "build houses for those who have fought for the preservation of freedom and democracy for others" and to give veterans "a new start in building a solid foundation for their future and the dignity of an independent life in a wonderful small town community setting."

Thanks in part to HeroHomes, Jarrad Davenport is optimistic that this year he and his wife will "start a new chapter, in a great community, with new friends."
