# Round Hill Local Grocery Set to Reopen on Nov. 18

For residents who've been eagerly watching the transformation of the little store on the corner of Main and Mulberry streets, the day they've all been waiting for is almost here: The grand opening of the Round Hill Local Grocery is set for Saturday, Nov. 18.

The store, at 19 Main Street, had been owned and run by Frances and Robert (Bob) Milligan since 1983. The Milligans were fixtures in the Round Hill community and many local residents have fond memories of the couple and their general store.

After both Frances and Bob passed away earlier this year, the property was purchased in May by Dr. Valerie Campbell of Blue Ridge Veterinary Associates in Purcell-ville. Since then, she has been working with store manager Tracey Roberts and chief technical officer Christy Bell to completely overhaul the building and its stock.

The grand opening will be held from noon to 3 p.m. on Nov. 18 and, according to Bell, will feature vendors, tastings, treats, and drawings for prizes and goodies. Parking at the store is limited, so patrons are encouraged to walk and drive carefully.

Regular hours will vary by season, but Bell said "it is our hope to help those early commuters, as well as those getting home a little later in the day."

Local produce will be seasonal as well, and Bell said the

store will also feature a variety of ice creams, gluten-free offerings, staples and basics from many local vendors, in addition to local beer, wine and cider on top of national name brands.

Round Hill Local Grocery would like to become "a place where people can stop by and grab a cup of coffee, a few items, and chat for a bit...a place where people can come and relax for a few — without the pressure of bright lights and long check-out lines," Bell said.

Progress updates will continue to be posted on the store's Facebook page (Round Hill Local Grocery).

## Town Hires Rob Lohr as Project Manager

"It is an honor to work for the Town Administrator, helping the staff and Town Council complete some of the really exciting capital projects that are underway in Town," Lohr said. "These projects will provide pedestrian and recreational access throughout Town and key areas in Western Loudoun."

As a resident of Purcellville, he added that he's "really excited to get a chance to

Mayor Scott Ramsey echoed Lohr's excitement. "We are fortunate to be able to tap Rob's expertise and experience," Ramsey said.

# Survey Seeks Insight on Parks, Other Local Amenities

The Town of Round Hill is conducting a survey is to assess demand among local residents for parks, recreational facilities and cultural programs.

Results of this survey will help guide the Town Council as members discuss the FY 2019-2024 Capital Improvement Program, scheduled for adoption in June 2018. Some of the projects the Capital Improvement Plan will cover include future amenities at Town parks.

The Town Council will also provide copies of the survey data to the Loudoun County Department of Parks, Recreation, and Community Services, to local community organizations, and to small business entrepreneurs in order to help guide development of recreational and commercial parcels in the Round Hill area.

#### **PUBLIC OUTREACH ON EXPANSION CONTINUES**

The Town held its second public information on a possible Boundary Line Adjustment on Sept. 19, with approximately 60 residents in attendance. The Town will continue gathering public feedback during the remainder of the calendar year, and plans to send a letter soon to

every landowner in the Short-Term Study Area to inform residents who could not attend one of the earlier sessions.

The Town Council has established a target real estate tax rate of 14 cents (down from the current rate of 18 cents) in the event of a significant BLA, and determined that utility user rates would not need to change due to any BLA of the scale currently considered.

### TOWN PLANS TO REVIEW WATER RATES

An updated water rate study is planned this spring independent of any decision on Town expansion. Residential growth the past two years has significantly exceeded prior assumptions, and the construction date for the southern water tank has been pushed out several years. As a result, utility cash reserves are now higher than required. An updated study will be prepared this spring to recommend new rates effective July 1, 2018.
