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Round Hill Marks Earth Day with Pair of Outdoor Events

The Town of Round Hill would like to thank the organizers and participants of two Earth Day events that were held on Sunday, April 22.

The first event was the creation of a new pollinator garden at Sleeter Lake Park, which will be officially open to the public this summer (exact date to be determined).

During the event, more than 60 people of all ages planted over 400 native plants/shrubs and 50 native trees in the park. The plants, trees and shrubs were carefully selected based on the criteria that each are native to Loudoun County, drought-tolerant and deer-resistant. They were purchased from Watermark Woods, a local nursery that specializes in native plants. Loudoun Wild-life Conservancy gave the Town of Round Hill a grant to purchase the plants, trees and shrubs.

The main goal of the pollinator garden is to create a wildlife habitat that will attract bees, butterflies and birds. The secondary goal is to educate the public on how to create similar wildlife habits in their backyards.

at Sleeter Lake Park. The Round Hill Appalachian Trail Committee worked in partnership with the Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy to plan the pollinator garden and to organize this Earth Day event.

The members of Daisy Troop 70079 handed pollinator seeds to Earth Day volunteers at the park. The girls carefully selected their seed choices after studying pollinator habitats and turned the seeds into "seed bombs." Seed bombs are little nuggets of clay, compost, and native seeds.

The members of Cub Scout Pack 961 have volunteered to adopt the Pollinator Garden to care for it and protect it, as well as keep it litter-free.

The second Earth Day event was a community hike to Bear's Den. The hike was led by Carol Dennis and Mike Johnson. About 15 people were in attendance, and it was so successful that the AT Committee plans to hold future community hikes. Sean Lloyd will lead the next hike, scheduled for Saturday, May 5.
