Ceremony Marks Opening of Sleeter Lake Park

After a soft opening in August and a weather-delayed ceremony scheduled for September, the Town of Round Hill officially cut the ribbon to open Sleeter Lake Park on Oct. 13.

Mayor Scott Ramsey and Town Administrator Melissa Hynes were joined by local dignitaries and members of the community who helped make the park possible, including members of the Sleeter family, for whom the lake is named.

The 11-acre park features a softlaunch for non-gasoline-powered boats, an extensive shoreline for fishing, boat storage, picnic tables and benches, and natural areas. Amenities were funded by the Town and Loudoun County, and will be maintained and operated with help from the County's Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Services.

"The Town is excited to finally have opened this park, and it was only possible with the partnership of both the County and the Round Hill Owner's Association," Ramsey said. "We look forward to adding more amenities to the site soon including permanent restrooms, a pavilion and accessibility improvements."

Speakers at the ribbon-cutting cer-

emony included President of the Villages of Round Hill Homeowners Association Joe Luppino-Esposito; Loudoun County Director of Parks, Recreation and Community Services Steve Torpy; Loudoun County Supervisor Tony Buffington; and Bo Machayo, Chief of Staff for Board of Supervisors Chairperson Phyllis Randall. All spoke of the cooperation among community members and organizations that allowed the long-envisioned and planned for park to be built.

"Sleeter Lake Park has been special for me because I have met so many passionate people who want to contribute their time, energy and creativity to make Sleeter Lake Park an incredible asset for Loudoun County," Hynes said. "It is amazing how many local community organizations have come together as partners to create a lakefront park with

an outdoor classroom for all ages."

At the ribbon-cutting ceremony, members of the Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy, Round Hill Outdoors Committee, Cub Scout Pack 961 and Daisy Troop 70079 were recognized for their service to the park, as well as Boy Scouts Daniel Thomas and Jeff Glackin, who built the canoe and kayak storage rack and water safety kiosk, respectively.

Local realtor John Sleeter also shared a few words about his parents, Col. and Mrs. Frank Sleeter, who created the lake decades ago to irrigate apple and peach orchards they owned on the hills around the lake. John Sleeter continued to operate the family's business, Hill High Orchards, into the 1980s.

Sleeter Lake Park was closed for the season on Nov. 1 and is scheduled to reopen on March 1, 2019.

Round Hill Names Hynes Town Administrator

The Round Hill Town Council unanimously voted on Oct. 4 to appoint Melissa Hynes as Town Administrator after Amos "Buster" Nicholson resigned the position to become Director of Public Works for the Town of Purcellville. Hynes has served as Round Hill's Town Planner and Zoning Administrator since 2014; no other candidates were interviewed for the position.

"The hiring process went quickly because we had a strong inside candidate who shared our vision for the Town," said Round Hill Mayor Scott Ramsey.

"Melissa's interview began four years ago, and she was chosen because of her passion for the community, her integrity and her hard work," Ramsey added.

"Those qualities form a foundation the Town can rely on to accomplish our goals."

Hynes said she feels uniquely suited for the Town Administrator position due to her institutional knowledge of Town operations and strong working relationships with Town staff, council members, local community organizations, local residents, County staff and neighboring jurisdictions.

"I have enjoyed my past four years working for the Town of Round Hill as Town Planner," Hynes said. "During this time I worked in partnership with the Town Council and Planning Commission on several key projects that will shape the future of Round Hill: writing the Town Comprehensive Plan, designing Sleeter Lake Park, and creating the Round Hill Outdoors Committee."

"These projects are still in their infancy and I look forward to taking a leadership role in implementing the goals of each, as well as tackling new projects and programs," she added.

Some of Hynes' first priorities will be interviewing applicants for her replacement as Town Planner and Zoning Administrator and hiring a permanent Town Treasurer to fill the position vacated by Angela Fletcher, who left to become Director of Finance in Strasburg in June.

"We have a huge backlog of projects, but the focus has to be on rebuilding the staff and getting our internal house back in order after a lot of staff turnover," Ramsey said.


