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Construction Begins on Franklin Park Trail

After 20 years on the books, construction of the Franklin Park Trail and the Main Street Enhancement Project finally began the week of Aug. 17. These two projects will be connected to create a single pedestrian-friendly path to Franklin Park.

A ground-breaking ceremony was held on July 28 at the Round Hill Town Park. Past and present members of the Round Hill Town Council and members of the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors were in attendance.

The projects will increase pedestrian connectivity and safety in Western Loudoun through sidewalks and a shared-use path linking the center of Round Hill to Franklin Park, as well as add concrete sidewalks along both sides of Main Street from Loudoun Street to the location of the former railroad station.

Additional Main Street enhancements include

curbs, curb ramps, retaining walls and a new storm drainage system.


Over the next several months, crews will be working between Lakefield Road and Franklin Park, marking utility infrastructure in Town, and relocating a waterline off E. Loudoun Street. Work will then continue in Town and north of Town for the

remainder of the 18-month project.

The total budget for this project is \$7.04 million. Loudoun County's Round Hill to Franklin Park Trail project is funded with local taxes and the Federal Highway Administration's Transportation Alternatives Grant. The Town of Round Hill's Main Street project is funded with

county and town taxes and the Transportation Alternatives Grant. The Round Hill to Franklin Park Trail grant was awarded in 2000 and the Round Hill Main Street grant was awarded in 2008.

SLEETER LAKE PARK REMINDERS, SCHEDULE

Sleeter Lake Park is a passive recreation park, primarily used for fishing and boating in small, individual use watercraft such as kayaks, canoes and paddle boards. The Lake is owned by the Round Hill Owners Association and the following restrictions apply:

- No swimming or wading is permitted.
- Capacity cannot exceed more than 18 boats on the lake at one time.
- Boats cannot be greater than 18 ft. in length.
- Gas-engine powered boats are prohibited.
- All persons must always wear a US Coast Guard approved life preserver.

• Any person operating a boat must be at least 16 years of age with a valid ID or be accompanied by an adult with a valid ID.

Sleeter Lake Park will remain open until Nov. 1 with gates opening at 7:00 a.m. Closing times vary based on the 2020 schedule (see box on left below).

Any vehicles left in the park after gates close will have to contact the Loudoun County Sheriff's Office for assistance.

Catch-and-release fishing from the shoreline is permitted. Monofilament recycling containers are provided. Anyone over the age of 16 must have a valid Virginia fishing license.

Picnic tables are provided at the park and guests are welcome to bring a blanket to picnic on.

Please follow the Leave No Trace principles and use the receptacles provided.

Also, please continue to follow the recommended CDC guidelines for social distancing while enjoying the park.

GRANTS AVAILABLE FOR INTOWN SMALL BUSINESSES

The Mayor and Town Council of Round Hill are providing grants to help businesses located in the Town limits offset operating expenses incurred during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The grants are intended to help small-business owners keep themselves, their employees and customers safe by implementing best practices, including:

- 1. Purchasing or upgrading personal protective equipment (PPE) needed to comply with new public health requirements, including, but not limited to: Plexiglas at point of sale, masks and anti-bacterial pumps for customers, and developing new designated pick up stations for customers.
- 2. Purchasing digital resources needed to establish or enhance an existing business online, including (but not limited to) website upgrades to better assist with online sales or delivery features and remote meeting software, hardware, and services.
- 3. Modifying facilities (installing Plexiglas, no-touch doors, walk-up windows, etc.).
- 4. Purchasing screening tools (thermometers, screening software and thermal cameras, etc.).

Other expenses include contact-less payment systems, cleaning supplies (and extra cleaning services), signage (for a variety of signs that range from marketing new contact-less services to reminding customers of social distancing), and outdoor furniture and shade structures.

The Town mailed grant application packets to all eligible Town businesses in August.

The Loudoun County Economic Development Authority will be issuing the grants on behalf of the Town using a portion of the CARES Act funds the Town received from Loudoun County.

Only businesses in good standing with the Town as of March 20, 2020, are eligible for this funding. Out-of-town contractors and rental-by-owner properties are not eligible.

VOLUNTARY WATER RESTRIC-TIONS STILL IN PLACE

The Town of Round Hill reminds residents that voluntary water restrictions are still in place until further notice. All customers of the Town's water system are requested to conserve wherever and whenever possible in their normal consumption of water and to refrain from watering lawns and gardens, washing vehicles, filling swimming pools, and like activities.

Incorporating conservation mea-

WAYS TO REDUCE WATER CONSUMPTION:

- 1. Don't leave the faucet running while washing dishes.
- 2. Newer dishwasher models are more efficient than older ones and require less pre-rinsing.
- 3. Wash produce in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- 4. Spread mulch around plants to retain moisture.
- 5. Replace the shower head if it fills a one-gallon bucket in under 20 seconds.
- 6. Shorten showers by a minute and save up to 150 gallons per month
- 7. Turn off the water while brushing teeth and save 25 gallons a month.
- 8. Repair any leaks inside or outside of the home.
- 9. Refrain from washing driveways and sidewalks.
- 10. Check for and repair leaks in swimming pool systems.

sures into personal water use will contribute to the community's water conservation, save energy, and lower household bills.

The Round Hill Town Council and the Round Hill Water Department are hopeful that more prudent use of water now will help to avoid mandatory restrictions later and are appreciative of the support of the public.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT FRANKLIN PARK TRAIL AND MAIN STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

Q: WHEN WILL THE PROJECT BEGIN IN THE TOWN OF ROUND HILL?

A: The County awarded the contract to Highway and Safety, LLC on June 5, 2020, and issued a notice to proceed in late July. The contractor is on site and has begun construction of the trail in Franklin Park and around Lakefield Road. Work on East Loudoun Street should commence around October of 2020 with work starting on Main Street in December of 2020.

Q: WILL THIS PROJECT BE AN ASSET TO THE BUSINESSES AND HOMEOWNERS WHO LIVE ON THE IMPACTED MAIN AND LOUODUN STREET CONSTRUCTION ZONE?

A: This project will bring many direct and indirect improvements to our community. The first improvement is the installation of sidewalks, trails, and street crosswalks to allow pedestrians to safely navigate Main and Loudoun Street while gaining access to Franklin Park. Second, the Town will be upgrading the roadway and storm drainage in this area to accommodate the new pedestrian improvements. This will address flooding and storm drainage in this area for the first time in history. Third, these improvements will set the foundation for the Town's Greenway Pedestrian Network that will link our community to future sidewalks and trails to the south, north and west.

Q: WHAT IS THE LENGTH OF THE CONTRACT AND ANTICIPATED WORK ON THIS PROJECT?

A: The contract is awarded for an 18-month project schedule and we anticipate about 14 months of work to occur in the Town of Round Hill.

Q: WILL THERE BE ANY ROAD CLOSURES?

A: The contract requires the contractor to maintain an open lane of traffic during most of the project so that the public, businesses, and homeowners can travel through Town and access their property. There will be times when the road will be closed for pipe crossings during the day but it should be reopened that evening. The Contractor will provide advance notice of any closure impacts one week in advance.

Q: WILL ANY WORK BE PERFORMED AT NIGHT?

A: The contract does not allow for night work. Only in emergency situations will there be any night work in the Town. All work must occur during the daytime approved work hours identified by VDOT.

Q: HOW IS THE PROJECT BEING MANAGED BY THE TOWN AND COUNTY?

A: The original projects were separated into two different projects with the Town doing a pedestrian and storm drainage project on Main Street from the intersection of Loudoun Street to the curve at the train station complex. The County's project began at the intersection of Loudoun and Main Street and headed east to connect into the existing trail network in Lake Point. The trail would then continue across Lakefield Road to Franklin Park. Two years ago, the Town and County formalized plans to have the County and their staff take the lead on the project. Based on agreements, the County will provide additional funding, serve as project management and be the fiscal agent for the Town. To help manage the daily construction, engineering and inspection services, the County procured engineering services from Whitman, Requardt & Associates, LLP. The WRA team will be on site and led by Leonard "Lenny" Coleman, P.E., CCM.

Q. WHO CAN I CONTACT IF I HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT THE PROJECT?
