Hometown "FestiFall" Invites Community to Come Together on Oct. 9

After cancellations the past two Memorial Days due to Covid-19, the Round Hill Hometown Festival returns on Saturday, Oct. 9, as the Round Hill "FestiFall."

Taking Covid precautions into account, the FestiFall will feature family-friendly activity stations spread around Town.

"The FestiFall is a chance for us to come together as a community to meet our neighbors old and new and to celebrate our small town," said Mayor Scott Ramsey. "All events will be outside and socially-distanced in order to gather responsibly."

The day will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the traditional 5k race through town, starting and ending at Round Hill Elementary School, followed by a half-mile kids' fun run, also at the school. Registration is online at www. hometownfestival.org.

Plans are still being finalized for the rest of the day, but look for music, food, lawn games and other sociallydistanced activities to be held at the

TOWN ELECTIONS TO BE HELD NOV. 2, 2021

As a result of a change in Virginia state law, the next Town election will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 2, 2021. The offices of mayor and three council members will be on the ballot.

Mayor Scott Ramsey is on the ballot to run for another two-year term; he is currently running unopposed.

Council members Paula G. James and Jesse P. Howe are running for re-election to another four-year term. The third open seat will be filled by a write-in candidate.

Candidates for mayor or town council, including writeins, must be over 18 years of age, have lived within the corporate limits of the Town for at least six months, have lived within the Commonwealth of Virginia for at least one year, and be registered to vote with the Loudoun County Registrar's office.

Voter registration deadlines are as follows:

- Online: Tuesday, Oct. 12, at 11:59 p.m.; register through www.vote.virginia.gov.
 - In-person: Tuesday, Oct. 12, at 5:00 p.m.
- By-Mail: Postmarked no later than Tuesday, Oct. 21, at 5:00 p.m.

Early voting opens on Friday, Sept. 17, and the last day to request an absentee ballot be mailed is Friday, Oct. 22, at 5:00 p.m. The last day to vote absentee in-person is Saturday, Oct. 30.

Absentee ballots must be postmarked by Election Day, Nov. 2, or dropped off at the Office of Elections no later than 7:00 p.m. on election day.

The Round Hill Mayor and Town Council elections have traditionally occurred in May of even-numbered years. However, in February 2021, the Virginia General Assembly passed Senate Bill 1157, which requires all Virginia towns to adopt an ordinance specifying that all municipal elections scheduled after Jan. 1, 2022, be held in November. Senate Bill 1157 became effective July 1, 2021.

Following a public hearing on Apr. 7, 2021, the Round Hill Town Council unanimously adopted an amendment to the Town Code that changes the mayor and council elections from May in even-numbered years to the November general election in odd-numbered years.

Summer Has Gone, But The Sun Is Still Here!



The Round Hill Outdoors Committee encourages area residents to enjoy the beautiful autumn weather — go for a hike or a bike ride, visit an orchard or play in your backyard—but please remember the sun is still here and can still cause a sunburn.

The three autumn sunburn risks to consider include: REFLECTION: Exposure to the reflective properties of water and ice when boating or on the ski slopes increase risk of sunburn because UV rays are reflected from the surfaces onto skin.

ALTITUDE: Altitude also plays a role in autumn sunburn. During autumn activities like hiking, mountain climbing, or skiing, increased altitude decreases the distance to the sun and also means the air is thinner, both of which lead to over-exposure to the harmful UV rays of the sun.

LACK OF NOTICEABLE HEAT: Unlike summertime when the heat is a reminder to use sun protection, in autumn the weather gets cooler and cooler and people tend to not even think about sun protection or to think that they don't need sun protection.

Autumn Sun Protection Tips: Everyone should develop and exercise good year-round sun protection habits. People of all skin colors, types and ages, especially newborn babies and children, are at risk from not just intense sun exposure, but incidental sun exposure as well.

Helpful tips for autumn sun protection include:

- 1. Seek shade between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- 2. Don't allow skin to burn and don't go to tanning booths
- 3. Cover head/arms with UPF 50+ hats/sleeves
- 4. Apply a broad-spectrum sunscreen to any exposed areas of the face and neck
- 5. Reapply sunscreen every two hours (especially children ages 6 months and up)
- 6. See a dermatologist once a year for a professional skin examination

UPDATE ON FRANKLIN PARK TRAIL, MAIN STREET PROJECT

The County's contractor, Highway and Safety Service LLC (HHS), has been busy working on the Franklin Park and Main Street projects this summer. The following work has been performed the following work over past few months:

- Franklin Park Trail: Excavating, backfilling, and compacting the Trail.
- East Loudoun Street: Relocating water lines, installing sanitary sewer lines and stormwater infrastructure, relocating fire hydrants, installing valves, and repaving the temporary road patches.
- Main Street: Installing stormwater infrastructure, relocating water/ sewer laterals, and repaving the temporary road patches.

Construction of electrical conduit,

sidewalks, retaining walls, and curb/ gutter is scheduled to begin this fall and continue through February 2022. This will be followed by project-wide asphalt milling and paving, which is scheduled to take place between February 2022 and March 2022. Project completion is scheduled to occur in March 2022.

Once completed, these two projects will be connected to create a single pedestrian-friendly path to Franklin Park, including:

- Construction of approximately 1,000 feet of sidewalk along Main Street from Loudoun Street to North of High Street.
- Safety elements (ramps and striping), curbing, drainage improvements, designated parking, streetscaping.
